Treasurer's Comments

Financial Reporting

BlowFly Cricket is classified as a Tier 2 association which is required to submit a summary of our financial affairs to the members at the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Tier 2 associations must lodge annual financial summaries in the approved form with the Director-General, NSW Government Fair Trading, within one month after the AGM.

Tier 2 associations must ensure their financial records correctly explain their financial transactions and financial position. Tier 2 associations are those whose:

- total revenue as recorded in the income and expenditure statement (i.e., gross receipts) for a financial year is \$250,000 or less, and
- current assets are \$500,000 or less.

Current assets refer to assets (other than real property or assets that are capable of depreciation) held by the association as at the end of the association's last financial year. It includes amounts held in financial institutions, stocks and debentures.

With a continuation of astute management BlowFly Cricket remains in a strong and viable financial position when one considers the small size of our inclusive club. Our funding is through a number of 'volunteer driven' fundraising initiatives, assorted grants, donations and sponsorship including the generous support of many local businesses who take such a keen and active interest in the ongoing development of BlowFly Cricket. 

Level 2 Coaching Course in Orange









Last week, between 2 and 4 June, I was given the opportunity by the guidance of Mark Rushton to partake in a L2 CNSW Coaching Course held in "sunny" Orange. Assistance and coaching was provided by: Jay Lenton, Dean Burkes, Grant Lambert, David Freedman and Gavin Twining. To add to this are those who travelled across Greater Sydney/NSW/QLD it was humbling watching and socialising with others in the group, thanks to Mark for prioritising this for me and thanks to all those at BlowFly Cricket.

The course was run professionally and focused on the perspective of coaching aka the motto taken from the course: "to coach = they learn". Each of the instructors not only shared their passion in their education backgrounds (Gavin Twining) or slow left arm chinamans (David Freedman) or dropped catches (Jay Lenton), ensured the weekend was full of notes and practical observations. The firsthand experience was great and the mentality shared will be brought to the summer season!

Learning from their previous experience and the valuable insights of slideshows and group discussions, you kind of forgot time being invested in a well-organised curriculum. All aspects of cricket was covered and no one could ask for better equipped and prepared sessions - including the one off's of bowling former CNSW players! This shared mentality allowed each one of us to grasp the principles as well as being engaged in the practical tests/activities for both individual and group assignments.

One of the highlights for me was how to appropriately understand the needs of players as a coach. The importance of tailored coaches was a running theme throughout, taking into consideration their age and their development. Such a personalised approach made it easier to share thoughts with the group as well as adding new elements to the definition of a coach. The main takeaway from all this, led to the conclusion of the importance of player centric coaching (peak interest) and ensuring an environment that suits all players.



The course also allowed us to pay respect to our best abilities, whether intuitive or vocal, in being the best leader and the best version of what a coach can be! Driven to achieve results from technical concepts (Biomechanics lessons run by Gavin Twining both online and in person) and motivation (Jay Lenton and Dean Burke throughout the weekend) ensured that as a coach, discussions and role-playing exercises can succeed via mentalities like "show, don't tell" and "less is more". From this, not only how to provide constructive feedback was shared for players starting out in the game of Cricket but also to be clear with the types of sessions planned out as for the intended objectives for all. Hitting the fine lines of nurturing player development and growth was indeed the focus by all instructors extending from understanding the player's needs.

The practical session at the end was another highlight, in the sense of adapting to new players as a [hypothetical] coach. We all had the opportunity to evaluate and run our own mock group session on Saturday afternoon in preparation for the individual coach session the next day. Witnessing first hand various coaching techniques allowed me to play to my strongpoints of improvising the session in ensuring a clear yet focused session to be marked on by Dean Burkes, representing the "show, don't tell" mentality. Not only from Dean, but from others including those I was watching/evaluating – ensured a practical insight into effective strategies and techniques was able to be applied to our own abilities as a coach whether helping a player or a team altogether in players peaking their performance.

Worth adding that despite the slow start at the middle of May, each instructor was consistent with their presentation taking archived footage and current videos off Cricket NSW and Cricket Australia websites. These not only enhanced our understandings of coaching, but also served to leading the path in taking in valuable references and lessons with us back home.

In conclusion, this coaching course was a memorable experience that significantly deepened my knowledge of being a Cricket coach. From the schedule to the activities organised, each instructor present at Orange made this an exceptional experience for all. I'm grateful for the lessons learnt and new skills acquired throughout the course and am very eager to put some of these positive impacts to the test at BlowFly Cricket!



As parents we have hopes and aspirations for our children, we want them to have happy, successful and prosperous lives, for those of us with children with cognitive, neurodiverse or physical disabilities just completing everyday tasks and life skills are a challenge. We need to teach them how to love, how to eat, drink and how to function in an unforgiving world.

We are thrown into the deep end, endless therapy sessions, doctors' consultations and experts giving us advice-juggling siblings, making sure everyone receives the attention they require, quality time with partners and extended family. This is the continuous commitment we will give our children for the rest their lives.

I can remember the day in 2008 at the age of 11, Ronnie coming home and telling me about this "thing" called BlowFly Cricket, he was playing soccer with St Ives in the "special needs" competition and was asked to come along, I said" sure" anything that would get him involved, get him to interact socially, run around and be active with others could only be good for him!



Bruce (aka "Kimbo") has had an extremely distinguished career within the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai & Hills District Cricket Association (HKHDCA) covering more than 40 years, covering all aspects of the game, from playing, coaching, and administration.

As a player, starting with Mt Colah CC in 1971, he played more than 400 games for Mt Colah CC and Berowra CC. All of these matches were in the A Grade competition. A remarkable all-round cricketer, he is one of very few players who has won the Association's A Grade Batting Award (1982/83) and the A Grade Bowling Award (1980/81).

Bruce was regarded as one of the finest slips fielders to have ever played in the district. In the 1975/76 Season Bruce was selected in the NSWJCU Representative team, which was pitted against bodies similar to it in other states and against opponents such as the NSWCA.

As an administrator Bruce was the Association's Honorary Junior Cricket Secretary from 1999 to 2018. He has coached many HKHDCA junior representative teams including the Harold Moore Shield (U14 boys). He has coupled this with being the Mt Colah CC Honorary Treasurer since 1991. Bruce is also a Life Member of the Mt Colah CC. He was made a Life Member of HKHDCA in 2005. In 2020 Bruce received an Order of Australia Medal for his contributions to the community. A well-deserved recognition.

Bruce has been an avid supporter of BlowFly Cricket, volunteering at several Bunnings Thornleigh Fundraising BBQs until a chronic back injury prevented him from further participation. We are thrilled to welcome Bruce to the BlowFly Cricket community.

Jared initially wasn't convinced that sport was for him, but as parents who have been around sport for many years, we know the benefits that come from being involved in a team environment and the community. So, we encouraged him to find the things that he enjoyed doing so he too could experience what we had. Which has led Jared to become a member of the BlowFly Cricket Club, a participant, and a volunteer with his mum at RDA Tall Timbers, and a team member of the uFit group at Prodigy Martial Arts. All of these groups provide opportunities for kids and young adults with disabilities.

Now, being the big brother of a kid with a disability can have its tough times, but for Damien, he has learned that being involved in Jared's "world" brings a lot of joy. Damien volunteers alongside Jared and his parents at BlowFly Cricket and he has realised that being involved not only brings joy to the people he's helping and supporting, but it is also fulfilling to him.

Damien began playing cricket in the U10's for Baulkham Hills Cricket Club when he was 8 years old. He progressed through the levels, playing for the Hurricanes, then eventually being selected in reps for Parramatta District Cricket Club. Next was his selection in the Green Shield (U16) team for Western Suburbs District Cricket Club where he played 2 years of Green Shield and is now playing 3rd Grade for Wests, all by the ripe old age of 17.

As you know, there are many formats of most sports these days, and the same goes for cricket. Damien enjoys the hit and giggle of Last Man Stands competition, as well as the fast-paced indoor cricket competition that is held during Winter. BlowFly Cricket was formed when Mark Rushton had an inspired vision that all children with special needs deserve the opportunity to enjoy cricket and improve their eye/hand co-ordination and confidence by learning new skills and interacting with other children and families in a supportive, sporting environment. The children's special needs include autism; Down syndrome; cerebral palsy; Asperger's; Fragile X; verbal and hearing deficits, etc. They play a hybrid form of cricket on Saturday afternoons at James Park, Hornsby during Terms 4 and 1 (cricket season), followed by a BBQ.

The Blowies also play cricket on Friday evenings with WPHCCC at James Henty Reserve, Dural; and enjoy an off-season Winter Cricket program on Sunday evenings in the MTO Indoor Centre, Waitara. The Northern District CC / BlowFly Cricket Inclusion Program is another wonderful partnership with the long-running NDCC Special Olympics cricket program. Several BlowFly Cricket female members also participate in the Social Women's Smash cricket program at NDCC's home ground on Wednesday evenings during the cricket season.

When it comes to succession planning, Mark Rushton has deliberately targeted younger members of BlowFly Cricket, for example, Jordan Jones, the inspirational President, and others. Mark does this to inject fresh energy into the club and to help mentor their leadership skills to enable individuals to maximise their potential. Mark empowers the young adults and teenagers involved in BlowFly Cricket to challenge themselves by taking on responsibilities which develop their skills, confidence, self-worth, social interaction, organisational and communication skills, and employability.

Mark and Jordan aim to set their club members up for success through cricket coaching accreditation, opportunities to implement their new skills; and where possible, public speaking, representing the Blowies at Cricket NSW, interstate and at other forums; taking on committee positions; helping out at the regular fund-raising BBQs at Bunnings, Thornleigh; sign writing, interacting with the general public, etc. This strategic approach will future-proof the Blowies with a ready-made succession plan.

Mark has always recognised the importance of clearly documented strategic plans, checklists and role statements for BlowFly Cricket and the other clubs where he held executive committee positions. To this end, BlowFly Cricket secured a Grant and engaged CLUBMAP to run a few Zoom sessions about 'club management' and to develop Strategic, Operational and Revenue plans. I participated in the CLUBMAP Zoom session on 14 February 2023.

The BlowFly Cricket not-for-profit organisation has been successful in attracting corporate sponsors and Government Grants, which has given them the resources to expand their range of programs to meet a wider audience. The BlowFly cricketers have been issued with a range of club polo shirts with their name and individual number on the back. They love wearing these colourful cricket shirts with corporate logos, etc, as they feel special with their own identity. These shirts also make the Blowies easily recognisable at their various cricket programs and at the regular community fund-raising BBQs at Bunnings, Thornleigh.

NDCC All Abilities Cricket Program

"You may or may not already know that I appeared with Will Harding on "The Clubhouse" which is part of the Spirit of Cricket Facebook Group, on Friday June 2 at 6.30pm on Facebook Live. We discussed All Abilities Cricket and what as a club NDCC does with Special Olympics and Blowfly Cricket within the local community.

I tried to use this opportunity to really promote both programmes and hopefully generate more interest and maybe even sponsorship through the power of Facebook and social media. Spirit of Cricket has some 3,000 followers worldwide and through "Shares" on Facebook can reach a wider audience through the NDCC Facebook page, Instagram and Twitter. Anthony Telfer who runs the platform did the interview, loves nothing more than promoting Community Cricket - his promotion of Veterans Cricket worldwide is phenomenal. Hence the success of the interview was as a result of a few questions and answers as supplied"

How long has NDCC been associated with Special Olympics and BlowFly Cricket?

NDCC established a program (in partnership with Special Olympics) in 2008, to provide young men and women with intellectual disabilities the opportunity to play cricket. Every Monday afternoon throughout summer at Mark Taylor Oval (MTO), Waitara, NDCC supplies coaches, clothing, equipment, refreshments and encouragement to a growing group of young adults with disabilities. It provides an outlet for the participants and their parents. Sport is an amazing elixir to people with disabilities. They feel very special about themselves promoting confidence and self-esteem. The relationship with Special Olympics allows these young adults to engage with that organisation. This opens the door for so many other activities for them.

NDCC joined forces with an established organisation called BlowFly Cricket. In the 2020/21 Season NDCC established a Woolworths Cricket Junior Blaster inclusion program (in partnership with BlowFly Cricket, Cricket NSW and the Sydney Sixes), to provide boys and girls (5-14yo) with special needs and/or intellectual disabilities the opportunity to play cricket. This new junior Centre features all-ability coaches from the unique and highly acclaimed "Uncoachables Coaching the Uncoachables" Academy.

How did the partnership with BlowFly Cricket come about?

It seems like it was only yesterday when Jerry Hook, President NDCC, was asked by Mark Rushton, Founder of BlowFly Cricket, to be more actively involved with BlowFly Cricket. In the 2018/19 Season Jerry visited a Saturday afternoon session of BlowFly Cricket at the nearby James Park, the spiritual home ground of this unique all-abilities club. The rest is history as BlowFly Cricket was then invited to be part of the NDCC "Back to Waitara Day" in the 2019/20 Season, meeting Cricket legends, Mark Taylor AO and Nathan Lyon.

BlowFly Cricket is absolutely thrilled to be working in partnership with NDCC to be providing all-abilities people, both children and adults, opportunities to be either playing or being involved in the game of cricket in the local area.

BlowFly Cricket is grateful to NDCC for including our all-abilities club in the Annual Presentation Evening and use of the new MTO Indoor Nets Centre, a wonderful facility. Our members are excited and proud to feel part of our local inclusive and progressive grade club.

HK&HDCA Report









After two seasons interrupted by COVID-19, it was great to play a normal full length season. Fine weather also allowed for both the semi-finals and grand finals for juniors and seniors to be played to conclusion for the first time in many years.

The 2022/23 season was another successful season for the association. Team numbers were strong across our senior (76 teams) and junior (135 teams) competitions.

Clubs also fielded 13 teams in the North Shore's combined girl's competitions. With maintenance works at Kenthurst, Samuel King, George Christie, Normanhurst and Headen ovals, ground utilisation was at capacity. Senior competition games were also required to be scheduled on Sundays. It was a challenging year for our association and club volunteers with the introduction of the new registration and competition management system PlayHQ. We thank our volunteers for their patience as we navigated our way with the new system.

The association's representative section had great success in the NSW Youth Championships, winning three premierships: Under 13 Gee Shield, Under 13 Division 2 Creak Shield and Under 14 Harold Moore Shield. The Under 13 Gee Shield team went on to win the State Championship by defeating the country premiers, Central Coast. It was also pleasing to field a team in the girls Under 15 Margaret Peden Shield for the first time in a number of years.

Members benefited from a number of capital work projects across the association. The nets at James Park underwent a major renovation with the replacement of the cyclone fencing and pitch surface, installation of black matting, new stumps and roof safety netting to an extended 9 metres. Pitches were replaced at George Christie and James Henty with wider and longer pitches. The James Henty Oval upgrade has enabled another suitable venue for the girls competition and we hope the BlowFly cricketers have enjoyed the improved facility for the Friday night cricket.

An Incredible Season









"May the angels lead her into paradise"


Beloved daughter of Deirdre and Alan (deceased). Precious twin sister of Louise. Aunt of Alana. Sister of Michelle.
