

Mission Statement

To promote BlowFly Cricket as the summer sport for children and young people between the ages of 5 and 18 years who have special needs by:

- a) Providing the opportunity for each participant to learn and develop the skills associated with the game of cricket in a constructive and positive setting.
- b) Establishing an environment for each family member to enjoy their involvement in the game, including coaching, umpiring, administration and support.
- c) Encouraging all participants to realise their own potential in, and enjoyment of, cricket.

- d) Enabling carers, parents and siblings the opportunity to share interests in the game and interacting with other participating families; and
- e) Fostering relationships with mainstream and adult cricket, in order for players with disabilities to be provided with clearly defined pathways to National and International representation in cricket, for players as the sport develops.



The BlowFly Cricket 2013/14 and 2014/15 seasons have been wonderfully successful with many highlights, not to overlook the individual improvement shown by all of our players as the seasons progressed. For me the following highlights need to be acknowledged:

- The once in a lifetime SCG on-ground entertainment experience in early January 2014, where our hearty band of players and parents were able to join in the Milo in2CRICKET on-field activities during the lunch break of the Sydney Test Match... once again, in front of a huge crowd of 30,000+ spectators.
- A continued close working relationship with Cricket NSW who has been extremely supportive and generous in providing Milo in2CRICKET equipment for our players.
 - Furthermore, the guest player appearance (Wayne Seabrook) was well received and popular amongst our members.
- Two new BlowFly Cricket Centres have recently been established at:
 - Camp Breakaway, San Remo (Central Coast, NSW)
 respite camps held its first session in early March 2015; and
 - 2. Mary Brooksbank School, Rosemeadow (Campbelltown, NSW) Term 2 will see a 10 week program commencing in late April 2015 with weekly 1-2 hour sessions for 30-50 children.
- The support of local cricket clubs including: St Ives Wahroonga CC and West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook CC (A Grade team).
- Hornsby Shire Council are to be thanked for the use of James Park, a quality sports field suitable for both active and recreational user groups . . . the kids love the playground equipment.

- The ongoing generous support of Abbas Aly (Triforce Sports), in supplying BlowFly Cricket with various equipment/goods.
- The generous support of many individuals and organisations in the Sponsor a Player program – what fantastic gestures of kindness and good will.
- The ongoing support and interest of Hornsby Ku-ringgai & Hills District Cricket Association (HK & HDCA).
- The end of season players trophies have been kindly supplied by Brad and Donna Caldwell of All Seasons Trophies, Hornsby at cost price.

What is the longer term benefit to the sport and our community!

Six years on and it is difficult to imagine a grassroots cricket program that has more potential than BlowFly Cricket to provide long term benefits to children with special needs and/or intellectual disabilities and their respective families and support networks. The model that has been created for BlowFly Cricket is easily replicated and Cricket NSW have unveiled plans to expand the 'All Abilities' program to create 10 new centres state-wide in the coming 2015/16 season. Additionally, BlowFly Cricket will further expand and modify the program to accommodate children in other special needs schools and/or suitable respite facilities. We as an association firmly believe it is a tremendous opportunity to work closely with community groups to facilitate a safe and nurturing environment for children with special needs and/or intellectual disabilities.

Looking back over the 5 years we have watched kids like Ronnie, Xavier and Jack grow up to be young men. And it has been a great delight to watch the improvement and enjoyment of the game that the two Ryan's, Cameron and Zac have shown.

It is also great to see other kids coming out and enjoying the afternoon. We met young Ty for the first time this year. We enjoyed helping and encouraging him to have a go and socialising with the other players.

Again we enjoyed our excursion out onto the SCG. It was even better this year because we managed to get seats in the shade.

Cameron's story

Cameron has loved ball sports since the time he could walk. It didn't matter what the game or sport, rugby, soccer, tennis, golf, cricket, squash, basketball – if there was a ball involved, he was there, having fun and enjoying himself.

When he was 4½ years old, Cameron was diagnosed with Fragile X syndrome which is the most common form of genetically acquired autism and cause of intellectual disability.

That didn't change anything for Cameron. He was still passionate about ball sports and was always emulating his sporting hero's in the backyard immediately after watching a test match or a game of NRL. As he got a little older, he would see other kids, dressed in their cricket uniforms, having fun as we drove past the local park. He was always asking me to pull over so he could go and join them in a game. All Cameron wanted was what all kids want – to participate and have fun.

This is what led me to search the internet to see what organized sport was available for kids with special needs. We found out that there was an organization called "BlowFly Cricket" which catered for kids with special needs. Needless to say Cameron was very excited when I told him he could finally play cricket like the kids he had envied so much.

On our first day at BlowFly cricket, Cameron was buzzing – he could not contain his excitement. Watching Cameron and the other kids take guard, go back 20 metres to their bowling mark, polish the plastic cricket ball on their trousers to extract a little more swing and generally copying what they see on TV was fantastic and hilarious to watch.

For the parents, such scenes are priceless, not to mentioned the friendships formed with other parents and discussing the highs and lows of parenting kids with special needs. It really is difficult to put into words the sensation you get watching the joy on these kid's faces when they hit a ball to the boundary, take a wicket or execute a run out; kids who can have trouble being accepted in the mainstream.

That was three years ago and he rarely allows us to miss a week. The icing on the cake was that the kids (and lucky parents) also got to go to the SCG and play BlowFly cricket during the lunch break, high fiving the crowd as they were leaving the field. The entire day was amazing!!

As a parent, I could not finish such an article without acknowledging the gratitude felt to those who created the Blowfly cricket concept. There is so much unappreciated work to keep BlowFly Cricket going. All we wanted for Cameron was an opportunity for him to participate and join in the sports he loves and we feel blessed in having BlowFly cricket which delivers on this and much more. Without the tireless volunteers and organisations like BlowFly cricket, maybe Cameron would still be watching the other kids play cricket through a car window.







Fragile X will never define who Cameron is or what he is capable of and, who knows; maybe someday someone from the BlowFly Cricket class of 2014/15 will go on and represent Australia. I look forward to that day.

Jacob becomes a BlowFly

It was a warm sunny day on Saturday 22 February 2014, standing in the middle of the field he looked at me and said "my turn mum", I replied with "yes mate its Jacob's turn". He picked up his bat, walked onto the pitch. I said to him "stand here, wait for the ball to come to you, then hit it." He replied with "OK mum".

As the ball comes down the pitch towards us, all I kept thinking was 'please let him hit one'. I quickly jumped out of the way as I didn't want to be hit by the ball. He swung his bat and 'POP', that was the sound of the bat connecting with the ball, we both stood there looking at each other stunned. Then we hear "run, Jacob, run". I took his lead and we ran to the other end of the pitch. Everyone cheered. I looked over and saw my husband Jason and daughter Courtney clapping and cheering too. It was at that moment I realised that our boy just played his first ever game of BlowFly Cricket.

Jacob is 11 years old and he has autism. He was diagnosed at 3 years old. Jacob attends a special needs school in Rosemeadow and is in year 6. Jacob is an active kid but not 'sporty'. To see Jacob joining in and playing cricket with the other children is a big step for him.

Blowfly cricket was set up about 5 years ago by a very remarkable, non-judgmental friend, Mark Rushton. It was through Mark, that children with special needs and their families have the opportunity to come together and enjoy a friendly game of cricket, without worrying about what other people may think about how our special needs children act, say or do.

It has taken Jacob 5 years and many visits to the park watching these very special Blowfly Cricket matches. Although Jacob didn't play the whole match, it didn't matter. To have Jacob finally have a go at cricket was an exciting day.

After the match everyone came together to enjoy a sausage sizzle and a cupcake. Jacob was happy to sit with the other kids and enjoy their company. Jason, Courtney and I were so proud of Jacob that day. To see him run, laugh and join in on the fun was priceless. That was the day Jacob became a 'Blowie'.

A day at James Park with the Blowies



BlowFly Cricket supported by HKHDCCA





The Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) supports the endeavours of BlowFly Cricket and commends the work of the volunteers and officials who facilitate these programs.

The BlowFly Cricket organisation was founded in 2009 by HK&HDCA Life Member and former Vice-President of HKHDCCA, Mark Rushton, who had a vision that all children with special needs deserve the opportunity to enjoy cricket and improve their eye/hand co-ordination and confidence by learning new skills and interacting with other children and families in a supportive, sporting environment. BlowFly Cricket is a summer sport for children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years who have special needs. The children play a hybrid form of cricket in which all players are on the field actively involved in fielding, batting or bowling. The players constantly change fielding positions and usually get three opportunities to bat in an hour, with coaches and adult chaperones assisting on the field as required.

The program provides an opportunity for each participant to learn and develop the skills associated with the game of cricket in a constructive and positive setting. It establishes an environment for each family member to enjoy their involvement in the game, including coaching, umpiring, administration and support.

All participants are actively encouraged to realise their own potential in, and enjoyment of, cricket. Carers, parents, siblings and coaches have the opportunity to share interests in the game and interact with other participating families.

The BlowFly Cricket sessions take place at James Park, Hornsby on Saturday afternoons during the school terms. The program has come a long way since it started six years ago, as highlighted in a magnificent video on the Cricket Australia website (http://bit.ly/BlowFly-Cricket-2014-15), which shows the inspiring story about bringing the joy of sport to children with autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, visual and hearing impairment. The short video outlines the great work done by Mark Rushton, his committee and friends in establishing and developing BlowFly Cricket, culminating in the children playing cricket at the SCG in front of a crowd of 30,000 people at an Ashes Test in January 2014.

HKHDCCA puts on an annual free clinic for the BlowFly cricketers at Mark Taylor Oval, Waitara and this season's clinic was held on 21 January 2015, which was attended by five young players and other family members, plus two HKHDCCA Level 2 coaches, Bruce Wood and Justin Epthorp.



HKHDCCA held its annual Cricket NSW Community (Level 1) accredited coaching course at the Sportsbliss Active Indoor Centre, 17 Sefton Road, Thornleigh, on Sunday, 20 July 2014. Ronnie Mackenzie (BlowFly Cricket Club Captain) successfully completed the Level 1 course, which was a terrific effort.

HKHDCCA is delighted to learn that BlowFly Cricket has recently opened two new centres, Camp Breakaway at San Remo on the NSW Central Coast (from March 2015), and the Mary Brooksbank School at Rosemeadow (near Campbelltown). BlowFly Cricket committed to a 10 week program of weekly 1 – 2 hour sessions on Thursdays in the Mary Brooksbank School grounds, which commenced in April 2015.

It is fantastic to see the growth of the Blowfly Cricket model, which has the potential to positively change the lives of so many children with special needs.

The Local Cricket Community

Cricket, in some parts of the world, has suffered from an image problem. It has traditionally been stereotyped as a game that is targeted towards the 'elite'. Whilst we have moved on from that archaic stereotype, I've always believed that more can be done to truly embrace the entire spectrum of the community.

Sport is a microcosm for the community and the marginalisation of children with special needs in society has been mirrored in cricket and other sports. BlowFly cricket is a significant step to ensuring cricket is available to all in a truly inclusive environment.

I commend Mark Rushton for having a vision of inclusiveness and embracing the differences in our community, to drive BlowFly Cricket in to what it is today and to continue to drive to what it could become tomorrow. Craig McDermott OAM coming on as ambassador has been deserved, formal validation of Mark's work, the work of all of the volunteers and the BlowFly Cricket program as a whole.

It was a little over three years ago, the St Ives Cricket Club committee made the decision to take our club in a new direction. Player numbers had been stagnant for over a decade, our relationship with St Ives Junior Cricket Club was fractured and financially the club needed a rethink. Rather than consider how to fundraise or recruit new senior players we required a sea-change. We needed to decide what our values were and what kind of club we wanted to be.

The values that I wanted to espouse for our club were also those of inclusiveness, embracing our differences, providing an enjoyable environment and fostering a love for cricket. I believe that if we promoted these values success would follow.

We have since formed the Wahroonga Junior Cricket Club as we could not claim to be an inclusive environment without providing an opportunity for the young members of our community. We took on 39 players in our first season and only three seasons later we cater for over 140 players in in2CRICKET through to Under 11s. Success has followed in our senior ranks with team numbers growing from six to eight and our general performance on the field improving markedly.

I like to highlight the success that has followed through the realignment of our values because I believe that BlowFly Cricket espouses the very best of these values. In time, it is my hope that St Ives Wahroonga CC will be able to con-solidate its own growth and focus on providing substantial assistance to Blowfly Cricket. Together we can ensure that it grows geographically and is financially and administratively sustainable.
