I could tell you were popular amongst the kids when every session I could hear Rory yelling your name before I could even see him. The big hugs from him to you were the icing on the cake.

Our new St Edmund's x BlowFly Cricket x St Leo's Centre was another great success. The students at Eddies thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and their awesome new cricket gear! Thank you to our coaches and volunteers who attended for a great program.

Thank you to all of our volunteers who have successfully ran our Friday night WPHCCC/BlowFly Centre at James Henty Reserve, Dural and our Saturday afternoon BlowFly Cricket Centre at James Park, Hornsby. Both Centres saw changes in the BBQ system and the need for regular hand sanitisation which was managed well. Our Winter season has changed locations this year from Mount Kuring-gai to PCYC in Waitara.

Thank you to Nicola Jones for facilitating the Centre and running both the BBQ and cricket session! And the rest of the Jones' for being her trusty sidekicks! We now have the incredible amount of 23 Uncoachable Coaches who coach at our WPHCCC/BlowFly Cricket Centre, our BlowFly Cricket Centre on Saturdays, our Winter Cricket Centre, and our new Inclusive Centre and School program.

Akanksha Swarup and Maddie Jones also coached at the weekly Saturday morning WPHCCC Junior/Master Blaster Centre. This is a great achievement for BlowFly and I am sure this number will grow exceedingly in the next few years.

Thank you to all of our volunteers who have run a big number of fundraising BBQs this year at Bunnings Thornleigh. Isolde Kamerman is one of our regular volunteers at these BBQs and just recently took over cooking the BBQ. This was awesome to see considering Isolde had never cooked a BBQ previous to the day. Ronnie Mackenzie, Club Captain, also stepped up to the plate and cooked the BBQ. BlowFly runs over 12 Bunnings BBQs a year which are completely managed by our awesome volunteers. Well done!

Thank you to all of our sponsors who have been pivotal in our development and progression. We have been able to comfortably start a number of new Centres this season (fully equipped with BlowFly shirts and cricket gear) which would not have been possible without our incredible and supportive sponsors.

BlowFly has brought families together, given confidence to both children and adults and enriched the lives of many individuals, including mine. Treasurer's Comments

Financial Reporting

BlowFly Cricket is classified as a Tier 2 association which is required to submit a summary of our financial affairs to the members at the Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Tier 2 associations must lodge annual financial summaries in the approved form with the Director-General, NSW Government Fair Trading, within one month after the AGM.

Tier 2 associations must ensure their financial records correctly explain their financial transactions and financial position.

Tier 2 associations are those whose:

- · total revenue as recorded in the income and expenditure statement (ie gross receipts) for a financial year is \$250,000 or less, and
- current assets are \$500,000 or less. Current assets refers to assets (other than real property or assets that are capable of depreciation) held by the association as at the end of the association's last financial year. It includes amounts held in financial institutions, stocks and debentures.

With astute fundraising initiatives, grants and greatly appreciated sponsorship BlowFly Cricket continues to remain in a strong and healthy financial position when one considers the size of our progressive association.

Our funding is strictly through a number Acknowledgements of 'volunteer driven' fundraising initiatives, assorted grants, donations, sponsorship and the generous support of many local businesses who take such a keen and active interest in the ongoing development of BlowFly Cricket.

Play was put to a halt but that did not stop us from making our weekly check ins with the Advisory Panel over Zoom, which also included one or two furry four legged companions. The Advisory Panel not only gave us back our connection to our club it gave us the opportunity to openly discuss future succession planning of our BlowFly Cricket Club, because, if we could remain strong through a global pandemic we could remain strong against anything.

We had a change in presidency, with the induction of Jordan Jones – the third BlowFly Cricket President. Congratulations Jordan. All registered players receiving complimentary shirts in their team colours.

Excitingly, we saw the return of Winter BlowFly Cricket on Sunday evenings at the PCYC – Waitara. All these new and exiting adventures were grown heartily from the generosity of all who have donated time, cans, glass and sponsorship and to see it grow with our Club is truly heartwarming.

There is always the question at game or event, "can my bag of plastic bottles fit in the car for BlowFly?" and it seems everyone is joining in. And yes, some days of counting are harder than others but the rewards and growth of BlowFly Cricket make these jobs seem like they are effortless. The sky is the limit!!!!! Congratulations BlowFly Cricket and thank you for keeping me on as your Fundraising Manager.

Grants for non-profit organisations

The NFP sector in Australia includes a wide range of social institutions, most of which are private. These include sports clubs, day care centres, environmental groups, job-training centres, counselling agencies, hospitals, clinics, community centres, camp grounds and many others.

At present, there are over 175,000 NFP organisations in Australia. NFP organisations are historically known to improve the quality of life through groups, activities, celebrations and events while bringing people from all abilities, cultures, ethnicities and walks of life together with a common goal. Most NFP organisations are reliant on funding through various fundraising activities including grants, raffles, BBQ's, donations and sponsorship from the government, general public and/or their respective community to remain viable and active.



A Family Perspective







I was introduced to BlowFly Cricket by Veronika Walshe (Angela's Mum) when we were studying at TAFE together in 2018. She suggested Robbie might enjoy playing cricket so I contacted Bill Peterkin and we attended a trial session at James Henty Park at the beginning of the 2018/19 season. I'll admit that I was a little sceptical beforehand because we had tried lots of activities in the past, and whilst Robbie went through the motions, none of them seemed worth the time and effort (for both of us), because there were no new skills learnt, friendships formed or great desire to attend from one week to the next. What got me over the line was that it was close to home, Friday evening and Bill sounded nice on the phone.

Robbie's first sessions seemed to be more of the same; he was far more interested in going down the bush track or to the playground. If he did pick up a bat and ball, he would be nowhere near the wicket, instead doing laps of the oval whilst putting the ball. The big difference was that no one else cared; the game went on and Robbie could join in whenever he felt ready.

It didn't matter if his "warm-up" took 55 minutes and he made it out on the field for five minutes. No one looked at us funny and tut-tutted because Robbie was up a tree and I was underneath muttering "Get out of the bloody tree and play some cricket!" through clenched teeth; or because I had to piggy-back him to the wicket; or take him by the hand and run with him when he hit a ball; or Mike had to show him how to hold a bat and face the bowler time and again.

So what makes BlowFly so different? Maybe it's because everyone involved has either been the one up the tree or the one muttering underneath. It's a place where the normal world is left behind and our "normal" is accepted, and dare I say it enjoyed, rather than apologised for.

Mark told me a story about a father who turned up every game for years before his son was able to get out of the car to join in a game. Whilst I have nothing but admiration for the father and his unlimited patience and devotion to his son, I couldn't do that so it was lucky (for all of us) that Robbie soon got the hang of cricket and started to participate a bit more each week.

Unlike all the previous activities, at BlowFly he gained new skills and experiences, made friendships (we all have) and has a great desire to attend (only doctor's orders will keep him home).

Fast forward to 2021 and BlowFly has become a family affair:

- Robbie's brother, William, plays on Fridays too because he has found it's a nice way to start the weekend and forget about the stresses of school;
- Robbie and William are also refining their customer service skills at the Bunnings BBQs;
- I thoroughly enjoyed playing in the Sydney Sixers' women's social summer season;
- The three of us are completing our Community Coaching Course;
- My parents are addicted to Mark's citrus marmalades and now cut up 10kg of onions for every Bunnings BBQ to keep things sweet with their "dealer"; and

 William and I even took a cricket kit to Germany in 2019 to teach our cousins how to play, with the inaugural Hamburg BlowFly Test Match held during the only three hours of dry weather of our stay.

Robbie's Story

Parenthood was quite a shock for Brett and myself. We had gone through life up to that point under the impression that good planning, hard work, perseverance and dedication (plus a smidge of good luck) were all that was needed to succeed. So we read all the books and took all the supplements and thought how hard can it be? Then William was born and everything got turned on its head. Now I know every parent feels the same and it wasn't the usual sleepless nights or the lack of a social life that knocked us for six; it was the unusual stuff like:

- Activating the child lock function on the microwave in the middle of dinner preparations (bet you didn't know about that feature either);
- Being able to open any gate, even the padlocked ones, so he and the dog could wander the neighbourhood or so he could organise the "Great Escape" on his first day of preschool (in 20 years no child had ever escaped from the Koala's room);
- Climbing up every tree and ladder, including up to the roof;
- Hiding himself or my car keys/wallet whenever it was time to go out; and
- Having zero patience or persistence with typical preschool activities, yet he could have a protest sit-in for hours.

The list goes on and my purpose is not to demonise William, who by the way has grown up to be a well-mannered, hard-working and very responsible teenager, but to indicate the level of relief we had when Robbie was a baby/ toddler and turned out to be quite the opposite. We'd done the hard yards with William and now Robbie was going to be a breeze. Boy, were we wrong!

Robbie was quite big and sturdy when he was born. He had thighs like Mal Meninga (not as hairy) and could support his head from birth. He grew at double the normal growth rate and within three months had outgrown the baby capsule.

He was a happy baby who always smiled and engaged with everyone he met. He could play with puzzles for hours without getting cranky. His first steps were a determined stride across the room before crash tackling William to the floor (payback time). Everything seemed to be going well until Robbie was 2½ and he lost the ability to speak for no apparent reason. He had been attending speech therapy with William, largely as a preventative measure, and the experts were at a loss. He received a formal diagnosis of Autism at three (William had been diagnosed with higher functioning ASD a year earlier) and with limited improvement in his speech we started working on nonverbal communication systems. I did a PECS course and he attended speech therapy and OT plus got extra support at preschool. Importantly, he was still the easy going, happy child he had always been.

At 5½ everything changed again and Robbie would be irritable or start screaming and have tantrums on a regular basis.

Initially I put it down to the change in routine and regular proddings associated with the specialist assessments required for his enrolment in a support unit. My sister spotted that he was having absence seizures, which explained the behaviour but unfortunately required more prodding by different doctors (Robbie did not take kindly to having electrodes glued to his head for the EEGs). The medication worked well for a while and we could cope with the odd seizure, but it was a short lived reprieve. Within two years his seizures had become uncontrollable by even the maximum medication doses. They had also increased in severity leaving him unconscious or totally paralysed for minutes at a time every week. The damage caused by these seizures resulted in a major regression of his academic abilities and speech. It also cost him his place in the autism support class. The neurologist was out of ideas after exploring a range of possible causes and the Child Development Unit at Westmead wasn't interested. We were running out of options.







Luckily his speech therapist recommended a new therapy approach based on the concept of neuroplasty (i.e. retraining the brain). The EEG identified that Robbie was having micro-seizures every minute in the parts of his brain associated with language and memory and this was caused because his brain was underactive in other areas, the seizures were a sideeffect of his brain overcompensating for the underactivity. His non-invasive therapy program focussed on stimulating the underactive regions and his seizures stopped and he hasn't been medicated for about five years. This meant that he could start other medication which helped his speech to develop (for the third time). It also meant that the sedating and energy sapping side-effects of the seizure medication were gone and Robbie could finally go on long bushwalks, etc. There have been other health hiccups along the way, like the time we all caught pneumonia but Robbie's was the worst and he had to be quarantined until the 9th course of antibiotics finally worked (don't complain to me about

COVID lockdowns), but he is still the happy and friendly boy he always was. Now we are on a long road to get him to catch up on all the things missed and lost during his preschool and primary years. Brett and I are realistic in our expectations and know that Robbie will never be a Rhodes Scholar but it would be nice if he learns the fundamentals and gains a degree of independence that allows him to participate in society. We know that Robbie's capabilities are far greater than what his communication skills allow him to demonstrate. We just need to find the keys to unlocking his potential. And one of those keys is BlowFly.

The Coaches' Association





The Coaches' Association is proud to have been associated with BlowFly Cricket for the past 10 years through the provision of free coaching sessions at Mark Taylor Oval (MTO), Waitara; volunteering at the Blowies' fundraising BBQs at Bunnings Warehouse, Thornleigh; and occasional attendance at James Park, Hornsby (Saturdays), and James Henty Reserve, Dural (Fridays).

The close working relationship between the Coaches' Association and BlowFly Cricket originated and continues to prosper through the long-standing friendship between Mark Rushton (Founder of BlowFly Cricket in 2009) and Bruce Wood (President, Coaches' Association since 2010). Mark and Bruce had previously worked together on the Executive Committee of HK&HDCA, where they are both Life Members, and they seized the opportunity for their two organisations to work together for mutual benefit of children, junior cricket and the community.

BlowFly Cricket was formed when Mark Rushton had an inspired vision that all children with special needs deserve the opportunity to enjoy cricket and improve their eye/hand co-ordination and confidence by learning new skills and interacting with other children and families in a supportive, sporting environment. The children's special needs include autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, Asperger's, Fragile X, visual impairments, verbal and hearing impairments. They play a hybrid form of cricket on Saturday afternoons at James Park, Hornsby during Terms 4 and 1 (cricket season), followed by a family BBQ. They also play a hybrid form of cricket on Friday evenings with West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook CC at James Henty Reserve, Dural; and NDCC Special Olympics cricket at MTO, Waitara on Wednesday afternoons.

The Coaches' Association held two free coaching sessions for BlowFly Cricket at MTO, Waitara this season on 30 September 2020 and 13 January 2021. The HKHDCCA coaches who helped the Blowies in 2020-21 were Bruce Wood, Daniel Wood, Dani Chivers and Jack Nati.

Mark empowers the young adults and teenagers involved in BlowFly Cricket to challenge themselves by taking on responsibilities which develop their skills, confidence, self-worth, social interaction, organisational and communication skills, and employability. Mark and Jordan Jones (President) aim to set their club members up for success through cricket coaching accreditation, opportunities to implement their new skills; public speaking, representing the Blowies at Cricket NSW, interstate and at other forums; taking on committee positions; helping out at the regular fundraising BBQs at Bunnings, Thornleigh; sign writing, interacting with the general public, etc. This strategic approach will future-proof the Blowies with a readymade succession plan.

The BlowFly Cricket not-for-profit organisation has been successful in attracting corporate sponsors and Government Grants, which has given them the resources to expand their range of programs to meet a wider audience.











It is great to see that the Blowies combined with Northern District CC's Special Olympics cricket program at MTO, Waitara on Wednesday afternoons this season. Another exciting new program is the PCYC cricket sessions planned for Sunday evenings at Waitara in Autumn / Winter 2021.

The BlowFly cricketers have been issued with a range of club polo shirts with their name and individual number on the back. They love wearing these attractive cricket shirts with corporate logos, etc, as they feel special with their own identity. These shirts also make the Blowies easily recognisable at their various cricket programs and at the regular community BBQs at Bunnings.

A total of 22 HKHDCCA coaches have helped the Blowies at our coaching sessions over the years, including Bruce Wood, Jamie McEvoy, Aaron Crofts, Nick Miller, Daniel Wood, Josh Miller, Cooper Davenport, Daniel Anderson, Braden Cheng, Tom Felton, Dani Chivers, Dylan Bish, Justin Epthorp, Will Fiedler, John Anderson, James Madden, Joe Hiley, Nathan Middleton, Jack Nati, Andrew Harvey, Utkarsh Somaiya and Alec Silins.

This will ensure that both programs will be sustainable long term and provide consistent employment opportunities for our older participants. The benefits of this program are wide reaching and have potential to create significant positive impact on the lives of our participants and their families.

Vale Tom Richmond OAM







It is with sadness that I report the passing of Life Member Tom Richmond OAM.

Tom had a lifetime commitment to cricket in northern Sydney, and the cricket world and our Club benefitted from his tireless efforts. He had a massively positive impact on several generations of Green Shield cricketers, and hence the Club itself.

Tom went to school at Barker College in the era of NDs greats Neil and Lynn Marks, and the Blazey brothers. He played in the 1st XI in 1957 before undertaking Teachers College in Wagga and fully involving himself in playing and coaching cricket, initially in the country and then closer to the Hornsby district where he had grown up.

Tom was NDs Green Shield coach for a period of sixteen years, and was coach when we won our first Green Shield in 1968/69. That commenced a rich period of success for the Club, winning four Green Shield titles in a period of 11 seasons.

In the words of one of the members of his Green Shield squads who messaged me last night "we loved him, at a time in our lives when such a positive role model was so important".

Tom was made a Life Member of NDs in 2012. He was a Life Member and Patron of HKHDCA.

Tom received an Order of Australia Medal in 2002 for "services to youth through education and cricket, and to researching the history of Hornsby".

Tom was a co-founder of the NDs Schoolboys Cup with Neil Marks. Last season the Club inaugurated the Tom Richmond Medal for the Player of the ND Cup Final. This was first presented at our April Presentation Night by Ross Turner, and Tom was delighted to know that this award was named in his honour.

RIP Tom Richmond (15/7/41 – 14/9/21) – a wonderful cricket man.



He was inducted as a Life Member of HK&HDCA in 1981; a Life Member of NDCC in 2012; and the inaugural Life Member of the Coaches' Association in 2014.

He was the Founder of the HK&HDCA U/15 Ross Turner Cup in 1998-99, and the younger Glenn Hourigan Cup in 2003-04. He successfully managed these annual events for 12 years before passing the responsibility to Bruce Wood in 2010-11.
