TREASURER'S REPORT

Financial Reporting

BlowFly Cricket is a Tier 2 association required to submit a summary of our financial affairs to the members at the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Tier 2 associations must lodge annual financial summaries in the approved form with the Director-General, NSW Government Fair Trading, within one month after the AGM.

Tier 2 associations must ensure their financial records correctly explain their financial transactions and financial position.

Tier 2 associations are those whose:

- total revenue as recorded in the income and expenditure statement (i.e. gross receipts) for a financial year is \$250,000 or less, and
- current assets are \$500,000 or less.

Current assets refers to assets (other than real property or assets that are capable of depreciation) held by the association as at the end of the association's last financial year. It includes amounts held in financial institutions, stocks and debentures.

Reassuringly, BlowFly Cricket remains in a strong and healthy financial position when one considers the small scale of our association. Our funding is strictly through a number of 'volunteer driven' fundraising initiatives, assorted grants, donations, sponsorship and the generous support of many local businesses who take such a keen and active interest in the ongoing development of BlowFly Cricket. A special word of thanks is extended to:

- Ben Gussey (Projects Manager) for his diligence, attention to detail and commitment to the task at hand (Grant submissions) is exemplary. Grants are the lifeblood of our organisation . . . thank you Ben.
- Kate Guild (Director of Operations/Secretary) for her amazing enthusiasm, support, tireless behind the scenes hard work and attention to detail is second to none.

- Marnie Nissen (Fundraising Manager) for her amazing energy levels, motivation and tireless efforts in promoting so many fundraising initiatives . . . thank you Marnie, and

FUNDRAISING REPORT





Reflections on my first full year as BlowFly Cricket's Fundraising Officer. Working hard at 10 Bunnings Thornleigh Fundraising BBQ since 11 June 2018 proudly raising \$5,500.00. With the ongoing support of Bite Me Bakehouse supplying us with in excess of 450 loaves of bread while the friendly staff of Mt Kuring-Gai Village Family Butchers bagged over 4,500 par-boiled thick beef sausages and wrapping over 20 meat trays which were raffled (free) for our hard working volunteers. This season's effort for the McGrath Foundation Pink Stumps Day far exceeded our fundraising goal of \$600.00. Together, we delightfully raised \$1,130.00, being an outstanding achievement.

Additional raffles in partnership with Toyota's Good for Cricket Fundraising Campaign raised \$1,350.00 and countless paper cuts as the raffle ticket stubbs got ripped out and sold. Bunnings Warehouse Gift Cards were met with excitement. The Gift Cards with the combined value of \$300.00 quickly resulted in over \$1,100.00 in weekly raffle ticket sales for BlowFly Cricket's spending on long sleeved shirts and long legged pants as part of the Blowies upgraded club uniform.

The 2018/2019 season has seen an increasing amount of Return and Earn collecting. Plastic bottles, glass bottles and aluminium cans continue to be collected at Bite Me Bakehouse, Anglomoil, Granville Diggers Club, P V Construction as well as the BlowFly Cricketers at our weekly Saturday afternoon James Park, Hornsby Centre helping to collect after enjoying a refreshment at the social BBQ. We also saw many parents, families, friends, volunteers and neighbours all working in partnership to fundraise and also continue the important War on Waste.

Our fundraising Return and Earn campaign has seen me walking dangerously the wrong way down one way streets, freeway on and off ramps and extending my arm into the Ku Ring Gai National Park bins at Bobbin Head and Apple Tree Bay where I proudly display my permit as BlowFly Cricket's Dumpster Diva. Since March 2018, this fundraising initiative has increased BlowFly Crickets bank balance by \$2,200.00 and crucially, helps to keep our environment clean and free of waste.

My role as Blowfly Cricket's Fundraising Officer has brought me excitement and has been a fantastic conversation starter but most importantly it has brought together people who were once strangers, working towards a common goal.



Our Newest Ambassador

Michael Barry Gillies was born in Wagga Wagga hospital on 8th October 1984. He actually lived in a very small town called Wallendbeen and the nearest hospital was Wagga Wagga.

At the age of 1 Michael received his first cricket bat, and he hasn't put them down since. Michael's grandfather and uncle both had a love of cricket, so his passion could be stated as being in his blood.

At the tender age of 12, Michael started to play junior cricket and has continued every season to play outdoor cricket. He had a passion for bowling and was a fearsome pace bowler. Like many former quicks, as he got older he changed to a spin bowler. He still loves to get out and slog the ball and on the odd occasion, he may very well "slog sweep" a four or even a six.

When Michael was 26 he was diagnosed with Asperger's and this puts him on the Autism spectrum as a high functioning adult. With many therapy sessions and support from his extended family, he has gained the understanding of how to think and understand life in a different way. His wife says it's like she runs on a Apple Mac system and he runs on a Windows system. Both do the same thing, but in a different way.





With a newfound knowledge of why he felt different, and the understanding of how a mental illness works, Michael pursued his dream of playing cricket. He took up winter indoor cricket and played most weekends of the year, practicing and learning his craft to play at a higher level. In the spring of 2016, Michael was selected to play for NSW in the team for intellectually disabled for outdoor cricket and was chosen to be captain.

The following winter saw Michael play in the indoor competition for intellectually disabled, representing NSW on numerous occasions.

Michael has been very fortunate as in March 2019; he has been selected by Cricket NSW to be the Intellectual Ambassador for NSW. As this role is currently in its initial stages of being established, exciting times lay ahead. Michael is also a proud Ambassador for BlowFly Cricket in Hornsby NSW and also for Lend a Hand to Hugo in Tasmania.

With two current sponsorships from Bluetongue Sports in Richmond New South Wales and Aura Cricket in Melbourne Victoria, Michael one day hopes to play for Australia with the support of these great organisations.

Maddie is a wonderful role model for all of our members, especially our younger female players. Well done Maddie.

Ronnie is one of BlowFly Cricket's leading CA Accredited Community Coaches, who coaches at both of our local BlowFly Cricket Centres, SONY Foundation Camps (PLC and Abbotsleigh College) and a one-off Hornsby Ability Options 'WorkReady' (for young adults with mental illness and/or intellectual disabilities or special needs) Christmas Function held at James Park, Hornsby.

It has been wonderful to observe the continued expansion of BlowFly Cricket, which was founded in 2009-10 by HK&HDCA Life Member and Patron (former Vice-President) of the Coaches' Association, Mark Rushton, who had a vision that all children with special needs deserve the opportunity to enjoy cricket and improve their eye / hand co-ordination and confidence by learning new skills and interacting with other children and families in a supportive, sporting environment. BlowFly Cricket is a summer sport for people of all ages, although the majority are in the 6 – 18 years bracket.

The children's special needs include Autism, Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Asperger's, verbal and hearing deficits, and the coaching techniques needed to be modified to best suit the abilities of each child, which was a valuable learning tool for our young accredited coaches, as is acquiring empathy for the day-to-day challenges their parents deal with so courageously.

The children and adults play a hybrid form of cricket in which all players are on the field actively involved in fielding, batting or bowling. The players rotate fielding positions and get many opportunities to bat and bowl, with coaches and adult chaperones assisting on the field. They play cricket on Saturday afternoons at James Park, Hornsby during Terms 4 and 1 (cricket season), followed by a family BBQ.

Bruce Wood, President of the Coaches' Association, usually attends a couple of Saturday afternoon sessions at James Park each season to help out when he's not umpiring cricket elsewhere. It's pleasing that BlowFly Cricket has expanded to Friday evenings in the West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook area, as well as other sites.

The Blowies 'club' has grown and Mark now has over 50 volunteers who work with him. The numbers keep expanding and children with special needs now who come from as far away as Campbelltown and the Central Coast, plus a 46-year-old man joined the fun this season. After working with Cricket NSW and Cricket Australia, a new resource has been developed based on the BlowFly model, to help other clubs establish cricket teams for special needs children.

Mark is continually developing the BlowFly Cricket brand, to the extent that they now have some older players who have been able to complete their Community (Level 1) Coaching accreditation and participate in the innovative "Uncoachables Coaching the Uncoachables" program. With the assistance of Grants and funding, the club is able to 'employ' these young adults, which gives them a sense of inclusion and self-worth, while passing on skills and encouragement to the newer members.

The Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) is proud of its association with BlowFly Cricket, which commenced at the inception of HKHDCCA in 2010-11.



The Coaches' Association was pleased to hold a free coaching session for the BlowFly cricketers on 16 January 2019 (see group photo below), led by coaches Bruce Wood, Cooper Davenport and Joe Hiley. HKHDCCA held another coaching session for the Blowies in 2018, which was coached by (Ms) Jamie Matson, as well as Bruce and Cooper. It was astounding to see the massive improvement in their batting, bowling and catching skills since our previous coaching sessions. The enthusiasm and sheer joy of the children was evident and it's clear that the Blowies program is a great success under an outstanding leadership team.

The young HKHDCCA coaches, Cooper, Joe and Jamie, commented that it was initially a challenge coaching these children with special needs, as it was so different to their usual coaching, however once they understood their needs and abilities, it was an absolute pleasure to coach them and play a small part in their participation and love of the game.

With Mark's vision now a reality, we find the pathway for a meaningful and purposeful role for all our participants is well and truly established. To continue to thrive and prosper over our next 10 years we need to continue to raise appropriate funding for ongoing training and development of not only our players but also those very important family members and/or Carers, who actively support our players to obtain their coaching qualifications.

Back on the road missing an exit or two along the way we arrived at the Jennings Street School wearing our BlowFly Cricket shirts and hats with pride.

Through the gates we walked with pride and a buzzing excitement together with our very own Maddie Shortte, who had been a key volunteer at our James Park Hornsby Centre for the past four seasons.

After our hello hugs we met our newest BlowFly Cricketers who were all so excited to play cricket. My coaching focus was underarm and overarm throws to the stumps encouraging the participants to knock the stumps over. This was done by simplifying and breaking down the throwing.....using their pointing hand to direct where Jacob, Travis, Emily, Jess, Kayla and Ebony wanted the ball to go.

Other skills coached by Akanksha Swarup, Maddie and Ronnie, while Mark Rushton joined in the fun and games amongst the school kids/participants just like a wheelie, wheelie big kid. The final test of their cricket skills was the coming together in a circle for a throwing and catching exercise as well as my name recall. Hi-5s shared by all-as BlowFly Cricketers hi-5 each other in all our Centres.

Back in the drivers seat we re-trace our tracks to return the car to Bargain Cars, not far from Tullamarine Airport (Melbourne). Walking through the doors of the airport to be scanned by airport security. Maddie and Ronnie having a quiet laugh as Mark sets off all the security alarms together with lights, alarms bells and whistles. The four of us are asked to come aside to be swabbed for traces of illegal substances, together with our baggage . . . "I assure you I don't carry drugs" . . . Maddie polity said along with Ronnie . . . "who would think they could get away with it?"





Patiently we waited for our rescheduled flight boarding at 20:00hrs. The time flew as we enjoyed dinner together and conversed about the day. Assigned to our seats we watched the safety tutorial. Landing back in Sydney airport after what was a truly magical day.

Jennings Street School (JSS) is located in Victoria's west. There are approximately 120 students in the school ranging from 5-18 year olds. JSS is a school for Autistic children that focuses on teaching the students skills they can use in everyday life.

I recently moved to Victoria and started working at JSS. I saw an opportunity to develop a BlowFly Cricket program at the school. Following discussions with the Principal and the Physical Education teacher the ball started rolling.

Cricket Victoria and BlowFly Cricket Sydney have kindly donated some equipment for the students to use. JSS is grateful and excited to see how BlowFly Cricket will develop in the curriculum.

Whilst working at JSS I have had the opportunity to start BlowFly Cricket which is a program designed to teach cricket to children with additional needs.

The program commenced with the basic skills of throwing and catching with a partner to develop motor skills and coordination. The students are able to use equipment donated to JSS by BlowFly Cricket Sydney and Cricket Victoria. These include wickets, nets and crazy catch.

Each session ends with a game of catch where everyone stands in a circle. However there is a twist and you aren't able to throw the ball to the people on either side of you.

This games challenges the students and teaches them communication, memory and motor skills.

The students were so excited when they heard that Mark, the founder of BlowFly Cricket, as well as Ronnie, Marnie, Maddie and Akanksha from BlowFly Cricket Sydney were coming to JSS to experience a session. On 4 March they came to JSS and the students were able to sit and listen to Mark speak about cricket and they had the opportunity to ask a lot of questions.

Following this, a series of cricket stations were set up including:

- Bowling and catching to the cricket stumps with Marnie:
- · The Sticky Wicket with Ronnie;
- Using bats to hit balls with Akanksha and Maddie; and
- At the end of the session they finished with the circle game and everyone got involved.

It was a terrific opportunity and the JSS students loved meeting Mark and the BlowFly Cricket Sydney representatives.

A PARENT'S PERSPECTIVE







Alethea's Story

"It's really, really lovely" my friend Veronika insisted. She had tried many times to convince my daughter Alethea and I to come and experience BlowFly Cricket. Patiently I explained again that although Alethea might agree to go to an activity that was held in the evening, she would never follow through with it, as this was 'settle in at home time' after her busy day. Many times I hadsigned her up for an activity – dancing, basketball, only to have her refuse to go at the last minute, or to quit after a few weeks. I wasn't willing to waste the co-ordinator's time again. Especially not on a Friday evening.

But when Alethea came home one day in October last year and said: "Mum, I do want to go to the cricket", I agreed to organise it, so long as she went with a support worker. I didn't want to be the one to have to coax her to follow through.

When I rang Mark Rushton, the founder and co-ordinator of the club, and he took all of Alethea's details, I nervously suggested that she may not actually be able to hit the ball with that thin cricket bat (projecting my own complete inability in the sporting arena). He reassured me that absolutely no judgment is made on a participant's ability or disability. Further, he said that for some, just showing up was a huge achievement, while others may find that cricket is their whole life purpose.

Absolutely everything in between is respected. And so Alethea's journey with BlowFly Cricket began.

After, or it may even have been during, her first session, I received some spectacular photos on my phone from Mark. Alethea, with bat in hand, determined expression on her face, waiting at the stumps for the ball to come, another of her running down the pitch. She came home with a fabulous blue cap that just happened to match her windcheater. She was elated. I sent the photos around to friends and family, and the cheers came in thick and fast. Go, Alethea!

The next Friday evening, and the one after that, and on until the end of the season, she was dressed and ready to go. Relationships were forming and she was blossoming. Something was happening that built her confidence in new ways. I wondered what the magic ingredient was. It clearly had something to do with Mark and from my conversations with him, it was evident that he didn't just pay lip-service to his ideals of inclusion of all people regardless of ability, he emphatically practiced it. There is a place in the whole for everyone, and if they wanted to play their part in any area of the club, they were encouraged and honoured and valued. This attitude permeated everything, and everyone who was involved practiced it. The culmination of this attitude is in the Coaching Programme.







Everyone who wants to is supported to become a coach, with all the honours that are associated with it. When Alethea heard about the coaching training, in about week 2 of her involvement with BlowFly, she was ecstatic. "I'm going to be a coach" she declared.

There was a Coach Training session coming up, which she attended. Alethea has always aspired to the top job; even as a very small child she had her eye on the CEO's desk, so being a coach fitted this yearning perfectly. She felt like someone important – a reminder for us of just how hard it is to be treated as the 'disabled' person who 'needs help' (or who is so often 'told what to do' as she indignantly expresses it). Just how pervasively this attitude is embedded in our so-called 'helping' culture was revealed in a conversation with my sister. When we told her that Alethea had attended a coaching session with her support worker Annabelle, and was now a coach, her response was: "You mean that Annabelle did the coach training and Alethea went with her?" In fact, Alethea's sense of self grew so much with this award that she then had the confidence to begin to work in a social enterprise café one day a week. This had long been her dream job, but she hadn't until then had the confidence to try it. When she does well at her work, she tells me that she thinks of Mark, knowing how proud he is of her when she achieves the best that she can. I think it is probably like that for a lot of the other players. Because of his pride in their achievements, no matter

how small they may be, they really want to do their best and so their best selves can emerge.

BlowFly Cricket Club is not just a feel-good, take it easy break from life and play a bit of cricket thing. No, it is a labour of love and a lot of hard work for the wonderful and dedicated team of volunteers that have grown around it. As a parent, I am so grateful to these people who all play their part in making it live and breathe, with such a strong sense of social responsibility. I am only just beginning to realize the extent of it, and only when I began to participate. The regular fund-raising sausage sizzles at Bunnings are an example. When I spent a few happy hours with Alethea helping at the last one, I met one lovely gentleman of 85 years who had the hot job of cooking the sausages. So many people, parents and friends, young and old, from 4 years old to 84, contribute through giving their assistance, in whatever way they can. For others, it is many, many hours, over years, and for Mark, at the centre, his whole life. I recently read an inspiring book: "The Long Ride Home", by Isaac Rupertson. His life was dedicated to establishing a centre called New Trails, where parents and their children, those with autism and their siblings, had the opportunity to experience the groundbreaking work that Rupert had developed with his own son, learning and healing on horse-back.





Many times he despaired of his ability to meet the enormous challenges involved in fund-raising, administration and management that were required, but slowly a team of dedicated people formed around him. At one point, Rupert was accidently over-dosed in hospital and 'died'. As so many who have come back from death have reported, he received this simple yet utterly profound message from 'the other side'.

The world, the universe, life as you know it, is all just a big experiment in love. Like a beehive.

Humans are the worker drones. Your job is simply to make the hive get bigger. For this to happen all you are required to do is to love actively. And if possible, help to build collective dreams of love. If you do that you are fulfilling my purpose. That is all I ask...... It is that simple.

Simple it is not – but BlowFly Cricket is a spectacular example of this endeavour to build a collective dream of love, and one which I am really happy to be part of!

Five years ago only one of my children – Cameron, was playing BlowFly Cricket.

Five years ago, joining BlowFly Cricket was all about inclusion and the opportunity for special kids to participate and have fun playing Australia's favourite summer sport – Cricket.

Fast forward to 2019 and I now have three children who participate in BlowFly Cricket and what it provides is different for each one of them.

Cameron's Story

Cameron has always enjoyed sports and so the last five years became less about inclusion and more about skills and social development. As many of you would know, Cameron is a very active boy who likes to bat, bowl and field. Listening to instructions and making sure he takes turn are some of the behavioural skills that he has been developing.

Under the watchful of eye of Steve Perry (parent volunteer) he has also developed his cricketing skills. His bowling is far more orthodox and straighter and Cameron even attempts to 'spin' the ball. When you hear Cameron yelling and screaming in joy from the BBQ area you know that he has taken a wicket.





Only a couple of weeks ago he came running over to where I was sitting to proudly tell me that he had caught Ronne and got him out. Whilst Cameron can catch a ball, this was the first time he had ever made a catch in a game. It was a very special and proud moment.

I cannot finish on Cameron without recognising and thanking Steve "The Coach" for his time and patience with all the kids. All their skills have developed because of the effort he puts in each week and for that I am grateful.

Kiahna's Story

Like Cameron, Kiahna also has Fragile X syndrome. However where Cameron enjoys sports, Kiahna does not! We encourage Kiahna to come to BlowFly Cricket simply to allow her to come outdoors and for a few seasons she would go down to the nets with some other younger kids to learn how to bowl and bat.

Whilst Kiahna may not have developed her cricket skills she certainly has developed her social and negotiating skills.

When Kiahna does decide to come to BlowFly Cricket she can be seen chatting to adults and kids alike in the BBQ area or playing with someone's hair (she loves playing the hairdresser).

She has also honed her negotiation skills as she tells me she will come to cricket if I allow her to have a soft drink with her sausage sandwich – which by the way, Dougal makes the best sausage sandwiches!!

Ryan's Story

Last but my no means least we have Ryan. Ryan also has Fragile X syndrome and playing sport and socialising with others is far more difficult for Ryan than for Cameron and Kiahna.

For Ryan, BlowFly Cricket allows him the opportunity to get outdoors and if not play cricket then to do some exercise or go on the swings – which he loves.

He is slowly getting more involved in the cricket and enjoys playing catch. This season he has even bowled a few balls to the other kids and learned to hold the bat and hit the ball. These are huge achievements for Ryan and I am very proud of him for applying himself this season.

What I think Ryan loves most about BlowFly Cricket is Dougal's sausages. He can have two sandwiches on his own and then come back to have a bite of mine.I am sure people think we don't feed him breakfast on a Saturday – Ryan loves them sausages.







Whilst Ryan tends to keep to himself don't let him fool you. He is a very cheeky, friendly and lovable boy and whilst he may not always seem like he is 'present', if you leave your soft drink unattended he will start sipping from it in a flash.

So there you have it. Three kids all with Fragile X syndrome all with different personalities and all taking something unique from the experience to play and attend BlowFly Cricket.

However none of this would be possible if not for Mark and all the volunteers who come out and help each and every week – many who don't even have children involved in BlowFly Cricket but still are giving of their time so that all the kids have something to look forward to each week in summer. To all of these people I am very appreciative and say thank you.

WORLD AUTISM DAY: HOW ONE SYDNEY MUM EMBRACED HER SON'S AUTISM LABEL







When Louise Cummins received a call from the doctor she already had a sneaking suspicion of what she was about to hear. But knowing didn't make it any easier.

At just 18 months old, her son Lachlan was diagnosed with autism and his mum was told by a paediatrician that he would be unlikely to ever have friends or hold down a job.

"It is a really hard journey when you get the call, even if you know there is something not right," she said. "It's so confronting to get that label."

Immersing herself and Lachlan into early intervention therapy in an attempt to "fix" the issue, Ms Cummins says she had her first moment of clarity after four years of trying to prove the specialist wrong.

"We were just both exhausted one day after therapy, and he was watching something on his iPad and he started singing the song True Colours," she said. "He had never really sung before, and I just felt like he was telling me to see his own true colours; I was trying to make him into something he wasn't."

To mark World Autism Awareness Day, the Sydney mum will soon have her first book about Lachlan, who is now seven, utilised in Australian schools to teach kids that being different "can be brilliant".

A Different Kind of Brilliant, was written as a Christmas present to Lachlan and features remarkable people with autism such as Einstein, Michelangelo and Mozart, to show children that a "uniquely wired brain" is a "gift, not a curse".

"Lachlan is just so quirky and just loves problem-solving," she said. "He carried sweet potato for ages instead of a teddy bear; he's like a little professor with so much going on in his head."

Ms Cummins said she hopes it will assist parents struggling on the journey from apprehension to acceptance of their child.

"My biggest tip to other parents is to just think about the next 90 days," she said. "You can get caught in this trap of [thinking] are they going to get married, a thousand different scenarios run through your head, but to just think about the next 90 days is the best thing for you."


Another part of her journey was learning not everyone will understand the situation, she said. "One time Lachlan was running around acting like Spiderman, just like a normal kid and some guy came up to me and said, 'wow, he's different," she said. "I would never do that to somebody, but in time you learn to embrace it more, but it's still a bit jarring."



Her biggest piece of advice to others was to stay away from social media. "Look at academic papers, and talk to professionals with credible advice, stay away from social media and try to mix all the advice up and think about what is best for your child."

Cummins, a single mother of one to Lachlan who was diagnosed with autism at age three, has created a colourful and tangible tool to help her son and other children around the world understand what autism. The book is designed to show how many successful people, all over the world and throughout history, have used their uniquely wired brains to change the world for better.

Louise Cummins, the author of *A Different Kind of Brilliant*, said: "I wanted to create a visual, and easy way to teach children about acceptance, what it can be like living with autism, and what it means to those on the spectrum.

I wrote the book to help my son, Lachlan, and kids all over the world to understand how their brain works and how people with autism have changed the world for the better.

Writing the book has helped me to understand the autism spectrum and given me hope for the future."

The book is designed to broaden perspectives and to reach not just families affected by autism, but help other children to accept all walks of people and their differences – knowing that that everyone is brilliant in their own right.
